The Past, and the Future...

Once upon a time, when the chapter was only a decade old, the Captain and parts of the crew decided they wanted to change ships from the *Galaxy*-class USS *Comanche*. Instead, the chapter became the *Achilles*-class USS *Regulator*. About two years ago, we moved into an *Excelsior*-class starship, keeping the name USS *Regulator*.

A discussion came up at the ship's meeting in June about the name Regulator. I never had particular feelings for the ship's name one way or the other, but I was always curious why the ship was named after "bad guys" - in the Lincoln County War, the Regulators were an armed faction with no lawenforcement powers, that killed (among others) the county's sheriff, William Brady. (Billy the Kid was a Regulator. This can all be found on Wikipedia after a simple Google search.) Apparently (and this is something of which I was unaware), many people on the crew – then and now – were against the name change, especially to a name honoring "bad guys." This discussion resulted in my sharing some of the ship names I've always liked: Sea Tiger, Batfish, Copperfin, Boxer, and others. In turn, conversation this carried over to our Facebook https://www.facebook.com/groups/USSREGULATOR/, and there we've been talking about how having a ship more suited to our Marine unit's mission (intelligence), and named after something more appropriate, might be a good idea.

The Facebook thread has mentioned several ideas for names: *Yellowjacks, Bon Homme Richard, Potempkin, Vespula, Arlington* (*Wasp* and *Hornet* are not available, unfortunately), and on Sunday 02 Jun, I found a list of "famous intelligence officers" which included Mata Hari, Giacomo Casanova, John Andre, Bella Boyd, and Nathan Hale. (Currently, I really like the name *USS Nathan Hale*, and if we go with the ship I'd like to go with, maybe name the ship's class the *John Andre*-class.)

As for ship designs, the famous classic TOS Constitution-class was mentioned, as were:

- the Hermes-class from the Franz Joseph "Starfleet Technical Manual" of 1975,
- the Archer-class scout from the Star Trek: Vanguard series of novels,
- the Saladin-class/Pompey-subclass destroyer (which has two nacelles) from STARFLEET's Department of Technical Services,
- The Peregrine-class, a frigate that looks like a Romulan Bird-of-Prey (http://www.inpayne.com/models/kitbash/trekpage.html)
- The goofy-looking Ascender-class scout (http://www.inpayne.com/models/kitbash/trekpage.html)
- The Vigilance-class Space Warning and Control Ship http://www.inpayne.com/models/kitbash/trekpage.html,
- The Minmus-class destroyer, http://www.inpayne.com/models/kitbash/trekpage.html,
- The Yeager-type scout, a "kitbash" using the Voyager's primary hull, and
- my current favorite, a computer-modeled early TOS scout labeled the USS Wildcard suggested by COFORCECOM Col. Brian Allen. A great feature of this one is that the artist be persuaded to put our new name and hull number on

Hello Darkness

A total eclipse of the sun comes to the U.S. in August by David Swanson

A crowd of a few thousand congregated for the event of a lifetime – a celestial pas de deus. From ou vantage point a hilltop park in the town of Sivas, Turkey, skies were clear. Then the midday light began to fade.

It was August 11, 1999, about an hour before a total soar eclipse. People circulated cardboard glasses so that we could watch the moon slink in front of the sun. Meanwhile, the shadow created by this celestial encounter, the umbra, was racing across Europe toward us at a speed of 1,600 miles per hour. The total eclipse would transpire when the umbra engulfed Sivas.

A minute before totality, the horizon to the west darkened abruptly and the crowd of amateur astronomers began to roar as the shadow approached. Then the moon slipped in front of the sun the city erupted in cheers as a ghostly white halo emerged from the moon's perimeter.

It was now safe to remove our cardboard spectacles and behold the vista. The sky was a deep dark blue, and stare and planets came of for a bow. The horizon was aglow in every direction. The air had chilled and, with the color drained from clowers and faces, the lighting was mystical.

A total solar eclipse transpires somewhere on the planet about seven times each decade. On August 21, 2017, it's America's turn, as a solar eclipse traces a path across 12 states from Oregon to South Carolina. It will be the first time since 1979 that the moon's shadow will touch the lower 48, according to predictions by Fred Espenak, a scientist emeritus at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center in Maryland. And the last to be visible from here for seven years.

While many of us have seen a partial eclipse, witnessing a total solar eclipse is rare and usualy requires some effort. Texan will be able to see a partial eclipse in August. But a position inside the narrow path of totality will yield a dramatically different experience that you can safely view with the naked eye – and for that, you'll need to travel.

"It is one of the most startling and exquisitely beautiful sights in all of nature," suggest Espenak. "It is only during a total eclipse that the sun's entire brilliantly bright disk is hidden from view, revealing the faint and glorious corona that surrounds the sun."

The umbra will come ashore on the Oregon coast, west of Salem, at 10:15 am (PDT). Here, those sitting at the centerline of the shadow will experience 1 minute, 59 seconds of totality. The length of the eclipse gets longer as the 68 mile wide umbra speeds across the heartland, with the greatest duration occurring in southern Illinois, where, Espenak says, totality will last 2 minutes, 40 seconds.

Viewers should also consider weather statistics. Sighting odds decrease for the eastern U.S. according to Jay Anderson, a retired meteorologist at Environment Canada with nearly 40 years' experience in studying eclipse weather.

"The farther east you go, the cloudier it gets," says Anderson.

Following several eclipses with less than ideal circumstances, the relative accessibility and favorable weather forecasts for August have pushed this year's event to the top of eclipse chasers' lists. It's no

accident that the Astronomical League, an organization of more than 240 amateur astronomy clubs, is holding its annual conference in Asper, Wyoming, days before the eclipse.

With hotel rooms and campsites at a premium, many of us may find ourselves reconnecting with long-lost relatives from Idaho or Nebraska, among the states with the best viewing prospects

The next total solar eclipse will occur in 2019 and will be visible in Chile and Argentina. The next eclipse visible from the continental U.S. won't happen until 2024, but weather odds are not as favorable as for the event this August, according to Anderson. "The great advantage of this eclipse is you can just get in your car and drive to it," he says.

LONE STAR, ECLIPSED (Here's what to expect in our state)

Texas is too far south to make viewing a total eclipse possible. Still, "See even a partial eclipse is wonderful," says Don W. Carona, head of the Physics Teaching Observatory at Texas A&M University. "And any location north of Dallas, especially in the Panhandle rgion, will experience at least 80 percent of maximum eclipse. Military Intelligence Group: OIC, VMA-333 "Phoenix Squadron"

Greetings, Marines!

First: the mission discussed in the last issue of this newsletter was – shall we say – "poorly received"; therefore, it has been modified. Your intelligence-gathering mission: using a digital camera (like the one on most cell phones), capture an image of as many different <u>historical markers</u> that you can. These all have to be within the State of Texas, and you should include the location of each marker, as well as the date & time you took the image. Second: relating to the ship name/class/etc. discussion (see the Captain's article), here's some information on America's first spy, Nathan Hale:

Born June 6, 1755, and died (by hanging) September 22, 1776) was an American soldier and spy for the Continental Army during the American Revolutionary War. He volunteered for an intelligence-gathering mission in New York City but was captured by the British and executed. His last words before being hanged were reported to be, "I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country." Hale has long been considered an American hero and, in 1985, he was officially designated the state hero of Connecticut.

After the Revolutionary War began in 1775, he joined a Connecticut militia and was elected first lieutenant within five months. His militia unit participated in the Siege of Boston, but Hale remained behind. It has been suggested that he was unsure as to whether he wanted to fight, or whether he was hindered because his teaching contract in New London did not expire until several months later, in July 1775. On July 4, 1775, Hale received a letter from his classmate and friend Benjamin Tallmadge, who had gone to Boston to see the siege for himself. He wrote to Hale, "Was I in your condition, I think the more extensive service would be my choice. Our holy Religion, the honor of our God, a glorious country, & a happy constitution is what we have to defend." [6] Tallmadge's letter was so inspiring that, several days later, Hale accepted a commission as first lieutenant in the 7th Connecticut Regiment under Colonel Charles Webb of Stamford.

In the following spring, the army moved to Manhattan Island to prevent the British from taking over New York City. In September, General Washington was desperate to determine the location of the imminent British invasion of Manhattan Island. To that end, Washington needed a spy behind enemy lines, and Hale was the only volunteer.

The Battle of Long Island led to British victory and the capture of New York City via a flanking move from Staten Island across Long Island. Hale volunteered on September 8, 1776, to go behind enemy lines and report on British troop movements. He was ferried across on September 12. It was an act of spying that was immediately punishable by death and posed a great risk to Hale.

During his mission, New York City (then the area at the southern tip of Manhattan around Wall Street) fell to British forces on September 15 and Washington was forced to retreat to the island's north in Harlem Heights (what is now Morningside Heights). On September 21, a quarter of the lower portion of Manhattan burned in the Great New York Fire of 1776. The fire was later widely thought to have been started by American saboteurs to keep the city from falling into British hands, though Washington and the Congress had already denied this idea. It has also been speculated that the fire was the work of British soldiers acting without orders. In the fire's aftermath, more than 200 American partisans were rounded up by the British.

An account of Nathan Hale's capture was written by Consider Tiffany, a Connecticut shopkeeper and Loyalist, and obtained by the Library of Congress. In Tiffany's account, Major Robert Rogers of the

Queen's Rangers saw Hale in a tavern and recognized him despite his disguise. After luring Hale into betraying himself by pretending to be a patriot himself, Rogers and his Rangers apprehended Hale near Flushing Bay in Queens, New York. Another story was that his Loyalist cousin, Samuel Hale, was the one who revealed his true identity.

Hale reportedly was questioned by British General William Howe, and physical evidence was found on him. Rogers provided information about the case. According to tradition, Hale spent the night in a greenhouse at the mansion. He requested a Bible; his request was denied. Sometime later, he requested a clergyman. Again, the request was denied.

According to the standards of the time, spies were hanged as illegal combatants. On the morning of September 22, 1776, Hale was marched along Post Road to the Park of Artillery, which was next to a public house called the Dove Tavern and hanged. He was 21 years old. Bill Richmond, a 13-year-old former slave and Loyalist who later became a boxer in Europe, was reportedly one of the hangmen, responsible for securing the rope to a strong tree and preparing the noose.

The United States Navy named a submarine after Hale, the USS *Nathan Hale*, SSBN-623, a *Lafayette*-class nuclear-powered ballistic missile submarine, commissioned in November of 1963, and decommissioned in January 1986. (The *Nathan Hale* was struck, and recycled in the Ship-Submarine Recycling Program, with the recycling completed in April of 1994.) Her home port was Charleston, SC, and she performed deterrent patrols as a member of the U.S. Atlantic Fleet. After overhaul and refitting (1967-1968), she was transferred to Pacific Fleet, home ported in Pearl Harbor, HI, and operating out of Guam. By April 1986, she had completed 69 deterrent patrols in the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Nathan Hale's hull number, 623, was used on the submarine portraying the fictional USN nuclear submarine USS Sawfish in the 1959 film On the Beach. In the film, Sawfish was physically portrayed by the Royal Navy's Diesel sub HMS Andrew. Additionally, Nathan Hale was the name of the fictional USN sub in the 1967 novel "Pre-Empt" by John R. Vorhies. This book involves a submarine commander who goes rogue and threatens to launch his submarine's missiles unless all the world's nuclear powers surrender their nuclear weapons to an international body.

I believe *Nathan Hale* would be an ideal name for a Starfleet ship that spends a great deal of her time collecting (and refining, and disseminating) intelligence data. Being named after a U.S. Navy submarine is a bonus, as so many Starfleet ships (and, for that matter, STARFLEET ships) are named after real-world ships and submarines of various navies, including the U. S. Navy, Britain's Royal Navy, and so forth.

Of course, your mileage may vary... let's talk about it!

Now, on with the game stuff...

Troll Lord Games puts out some great stuff. Their flagship is, without a doubt, Castles and Crusades – a new-style RPG with an old-school feel. This is what 4th Edition of D&D should have been... it feels like a streamlined version of 3E, in fact. The "engine" of the game is pretty streamlined, and, like D&D in the old days, can be co-opted for use in other genres. Thus, if you want to play a great

RPG set in the universe of the Pulps (think The Phantom, Alan Quartermain, and Indiana Jones), pick up a copy of Amazing Adventures.

If you're a role-playing gamer, most of the system is very familiar. Six stats, ranging from 3 to 18, giving attribute modifiers; these modifiers are added to a d20 roll to attempt to beat a target number. There's some special bits about "primary" or "secondary" attributes, as well as some special bits on various special abilities, but that's the main point. "Armor Class" is affected by what you wear... so, if I'm wearing my trench coat and fedora, I'm AC 13... adding my fancy duds and a nice pair of gloves, I can get up to an AC 16. Groovy!

The books are readily available on DriveThruRPG.com – which was running a sale when I picked 'em up digitally. I haven't had a chance to play, yet. I haven't even rolled up a character... but this game, and this system, is definitely on the list to try out!

Grab some dice, and let's start killin' some goblins – ... Sum non Satis?
