The April meeting was the annual Klingon Dinner Thing, and I'll be talking about it from "Kommodore Klark's" point of view in the Klingon's article. I did bring up a couple of interesting items however.

First, I've been working on a guidebook for the ship, on the subject of uniforms. Uniforms are not, and will not, be required, but I've always thought that we should have a guidebook to help people put their uniforms together. The Marines have their own uniforms, and part of the Marine Force Manual is dedicated to Marine uniforms. Likewise, the STARFLEET Special Operations have a uniform manual ("Guide to the Wear and Appearance of STARFLEET Special Operations Uniforms and Insignia").

Some of the material between the manuals overlap, and many sources in Star Trek fandom disagree on some points. Despite this, I have tried to use the most trusted and most accepted sources. There are points on which I

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disagree with the common sources (the rank stripes for vice-admirals and admirals, for example), but that's noted within.

I finished the guidebook the same day I started writing this report (20 Apr, Stardate 11604.20) and I have invited proofreading and commentary. (There's a post on Facebook with the PDF of the guidebook.) At the 21 May

Ship's meeting at Shady Oaks BBQ, I will present it officially to the crew, and I hope it will become official soon.

Secondly, in reference to our discussion on March about updating the Ship's Articles: we have formed a committee to review, re-design, and re-write the Ship's Articles. The Articles Committee will be meeting at Shady Oaks on 14 May (Stardate 11605.14) at 1500hrs. The current Ship's Articles (2015 edition) are available for download at the ship's website – as is the errata, the paragraph that was left out of the 2013 and 2015 editions on accident. Date Night, April 23<sup>rd</sup>: Tank and I went into Decatur and watched *Batman vs. Superman: Dawn of Justice.* The next day we watched *Man of Steel.* Needless to say, I have found myself in a Superman frame of mind. I began reading a fabulous book entitled *The Superman Handbook: The Ultimate Guide to Saving the Day* by Scott Beatty. Not only is it hilarious but it is also quite informative and helpful.

You all know how much I love being helpful, so I thought I would share some tips from the handbook. I'll spread them out over the course of several articles. (See: helpful!)

The first tip I will share is How to stop a Runaway car. Since we really don't have a Superman, it's always nice to know how to do things for yourself. And knowing how to stop your car safely if the brakes go out while you are doing 80 miles an hour cruising down a freeway is a good thing to know.

#### From inside your car:

*Turn on your hazard lights.* It is very important to let others know you are having car troubles.

Take the car out of gear. Drop it down to Neutral so your cars drivetrain isn't continuing to propel the car forward.

*Head toward a hill.* The upward angle might slow the car; thus allowing you to safely turn off to a level road and put the car in reverse.

*Try to put the car in reverse.* This will slow the car as the drive attempts to go in the opposite direction. Once the car has slowed, drop out of gear again then turn off the engine.

Apply the parking brake.



# Have Phaser, Will Travel!

This I say every month, and I'll say it again: You should, when and as possible, be taking Ranger courses from STARFLEET Academy. You can get the lists of what you should take for each Grade (1 through 10) from the Publications page of the SFSO web site: https://sfisfso.wordpress.com/publications/ There's a lot of stuff to learn, and it's fun. Do it! When you complete a grade, notify me, letting me know the dates you completed each course within the grade. I'll send it up through my chain of command, and get you certified. Easy-peasy. Completing Grade Two earns you the Major Hayes ribbon.

Now, on with the game stuff...

I love watching Westerns. *True Grit* – the definitive one, the one with John Wayne, Glen Campbell, and Kim Darby – is my favorite movie, with *She Wore a Yellow Ribbon* in a very firm second place. My TiVo records *Bat Masterson, The Life and Legend of Wyatt Earp, Gunsmoke,* and *Maverick* without me telling it to do so, and when it was on the Encore Westerns channel, *Have Gun, Will Travel* as well. It should come as no big surprise, therefore, that I own a surfeit of "Wild West" genre role playing games (RPGs). I have every edition of TSR's "*Boot Hill*" game, in PDF format, as well as GURPS "*Old West*" and "*Aces & Eights*" by Kenzer & Co. I recently came across a very rules-lite game, though, entitled "*Tombstone: Role—Playing in the Wild West*." This game was free (my favorite price) at RPGNow.Com, and is listed as an "Alpha Playtest", version V.I. You get a lot more than you pay for with this RPG, though.

Tombstone has a very simple base mechanic: roll three six-sided dice (3d6), trying to beat a target number (in this game, called the "Roll Required"). If the roll equals or exceeds the roll required, the attempted action has generally been successful. Single (occasionally multiple) dice are rolled for damage done. A four-sided die (1d4) is used, as the "Fortune Dice" mechanic.

There are two methods of generating a player character (PC). In Method A, one chooses a gender for the PC, gives the PC a name, and selects a "Quick Play" character. Method B is not much more complicated, replacing the third step above with selecting a background (other games might call this a Class), assigning Skill Points, and buying weapons and equipment.

There are only six backgrounds, and one of them is optional. One may be a Folk Hero, a Gambler, an Indian Brave, an Outlaw, a Soldier, or the optional Holy-Roller. Each background has special abilities at certain levels, and has restrictions on how to assign skill points.

There aren't many skills in this game, either. Health, Defense, Gunfighting, Brawling, Personality, Investigation, Willpower. One also must know the PC's speed and how many fortune dice one has available, as well as the PC's possessions and money, but that's easily scribbled down, too.

At first level, characters distribute five points amongst their skills, obeying restrictions listed according to their Background, and not applying more than two points to any one skill.

The Health skill is a bit different, and serves a purpose not unlike Hit Points in other games. A beginning character (not a Quick Play PC, but a Method B character) rolls 1d6+3 to determine starting Health. After doing a bit of math, one sees that a first-level character has a Health skill anywhere between four and eleven. Your average six-gun does 1d6 points of damage... so gunfights are appropriately deadly. (A Gatling gun spits out 6d6 of damage – you would want to be on the trigger-side of it!)

There is a short equipment list in the rulebook, as well as a few different scenarios. If you're familiar with the genre, it wouldn't be very hard to come up with several scenarios to play.

Reading through it, it looks like a simple, easy-to-play, fun RPG. It's rules-lite and adventure-heavy.
