First Officer Report

The March meeting was small, as the Captain & the Chief Engineer were on a Landing Party, and CWO Wilkerson was on a completely different Landing Party, and some others were unable to attend due to Real World things, but we had a good time. It's always good to see everyone – it's one of my favorite things about the *Regulator* and STARFLEET.

There were a couple of pretty interesting things that we discussed, though. First, Rear Admiral Goulet came up with a great way of raising some funds for the ship (and our charity/charities). About 3-4 times a year, we will be holding an auction for contributed items. These items may be made, purchased, or simply a collectible that will be donated to the ship. Pictures will be taken, and the item will be view-able on our web site, on our Facebook page, and other social media, and we'll take bids from anyone – not only within the ship, but within the region, and from friendly non-STARFLEET organizations. If you have any questions, aim 'em at Liz, at least for this first round.

It has been observed that if you do something once, it's an occurrence. If, however, you do it twice (or more often) at a fairly regular interval, it becomes a tradition. (This may mean that our chapter changes ships every decade or so... it remains to be seen.) One such unintentional "tradition" is that in the runup to Ship Elections (held every two years, in odd-numbered years, in April), we review and revise our Ship's Articles: the Handbook, General Orders, and Constitution. There haven't been many changes over the years, and most of them have been fairly minor — with the exception of the pretty-pretty pictures and formatting, it's about the same one I received when I joined the ship back in 2009.

One of the important changes was when we added term limits to the Captaincy. Before 2011, once someone was elected Captain he could continue to run every two years, and stay until either he burnt out or until he was tossed out. Now, one may serve no more than two two-year terms sequentially – so, after four years, he has to step down, and can't stand for Captain again until the next election. In other words, he's got to take a break.

In March, it was suggested that maybe we should start looking at the Articles again (we have about a year until Elections), and that one of the changes that we might want to make is adding term limits to department heads (DH). The conversation evolved, and by the end of it we were looking at maybe dropping the department heads as the "leadership" of the ship (we have nine DH s, and 18 National members – too many chiefs, not enough Indians), replacing the Department structure with a Division structure. Three Divisions (Gold, Blue, Red) plus the CO & XO to form the "Leadership Committee", as well as maybe serve as a permanent Promotion Board. There would still be a need for members to perform "real-world" jobs, like writing the newsletter, coordinating charitable efforts, fundraising, and so on; these positions would have their own titles and would report to the appropriate Division Leader – the job titles may change from what we have now.

There's a lot to discuss, and there's nothing keeping us from changing anything – except, of course, we have to follow the procedures in the Articles to change the Articles.

I would like to have an open committee, of anyone who's interested in working on this project, get together periodically and work on this project. Perhaps we could meet after the monthly ship's meeting, or maybe have separate meetings elsewhere – that's up to whoever wants to work on this with me. I have a lot of notes written down (because I can't remember things unless I write 'em down) on my Google Drive, and I've shared them with some of you already. If you want to work on this, let me know, and I'll share what I have.

I don't know if we'll get into this discussion in April at the Klingon Dinner Thing or not; if not, we'll chat about it in May.

I say this every month, and I'll say it again: You should, when and as possible, be taking Ranger courses from STARFLEET

Academy. You can get the lists of what you should take for each Grade (1 through 10) from the Publications page of the SFSO web site:

There's a lot of stuff to learn, and it's fun. Do it! When you complete a grade, notify me, letting me know the dates you completed each course within the grade. I'll send it up through my chain of command, and get you certified. Easy-peasy. Completing Grade Two earns you the Major Hayes ribbon.

The SFSO Uniform Manual has been updated. It now includes as an official option for all SFSO members, the "garrison cap" – also called an "overseas cap" (and derisively called a rather rude word beginning with the letter "C" - cap). This is because of an effort by yours truly, and a prototype made by the Assistant Team Leader of the 33rd STARFLEET Rangers, Commander Tracy Clark. Also in the new Uniform Manual is an option for wearing a kilt with dress uniforms. The SFMC does NOT permit wearing of the kilt, according to the SFMC Marine Force Manual. I'm very pleased – and, since Tracy is planning to make me an SFMC TOS Dress Uniform (in Hunter Green), I eagerly anticipate wearing it with my kilt.

Now, on with the game stuff...

As I have said before, I have a lot of roleplaying games (RPGs) in my horde. (Not a collection: "collections" are organized, while a horde isn't.) I love reading them, and seeing how they work — and how they don't. I eagerly seek out RPGs that I don't own. However, I don't have an unlimited amount of money, so I concentrate my search for physical RPG books at used book stores, like Half-Price Books and Recycled Books. After the March ship's meeting, we visited the Half-Price in Watauga, where I found a copy of "Hackmaster Basic", as well as the setting book for "Shadowforce: Archer" (for the first edition of Spycraft, a d20 spy RPG.)

Once upon a time, Wizards of the Coast (WoTC) decided to introduce a new version of Advanced Dungeons & Dragons (AD&D). The game was, at that time, in its second edition, and was very successful, but as there were an over-abundance of supplemental rule books – some of which were *very* unbalanced, WoTC was probably very smart to bring out a third edition. The Third Edition (3E) D&D rules were even released as Open Source material, and the proliferation of d20 games began.

Meanwhile, there was a very popular (and still ongoing) series of Web comics, entitled "Knights of the Dinner Table" (http://www.kenzerco.com/Operiodicals/kodt/kodt %20webstrips/phpslideshow.php) in which the characters played a very complicated, arcane RPG called "Hackmaster" which was quite obviously a fictional version of AD&D (2nd Ed.) In the run-up to the release of 3E, some old-school gamers over-reacted, and the characters in Knights of the Dinner Table (KoDT) did, too... only, in the strip, they were complaining about the release of Hackmaster Fourth Edition.

The owners of KoDT did something amazingly smart. They purchased the rights to AD&D 2nd Edition, added a HUGE amount of craziness (from the KoDT strip), and released it, as "*Hackmaster*, Fourth Edition." It was entertaining to read, but I personally found it a hassle to play. At the time, I was playing in a 2nd Ed game, and the Dungeon Master (DM) forbade us players to have a copy of the DM Guide out during play. During one session, at which I had a copy of the *Hackmaster* DM Guide, I looked up something in it and read it out loud – after which, I was forbidden to have that book open at the game. Too close to 2nd Ed... in many cases, word-for-word.

Regardless, I have known people who've played *Hackmaster* and enjoyed it. Kenzer, the publisher, is a very strong company, and they've released some great products, both within and without the *Hackmaster* line. (One of which is sitting on my shelf, *Aces & Eights*, a Western RPG.)

Which brings me back to *Hackmaster Basic*, the game I bought in March. I initially believed it to be a variant of the "Red Box" *Dungeons and Dragons* I first played in the late 1970s & early 1980s. Upon further review, however, it is in fact its own system. I see elements from *D&D*, and from *AD&D*, and from *Hackmaster*, but it stands alone in its own right. In the forward and introduction to the book, it states that this represents a new version of *Hackmaster* (either second edition, or "fifth", depending on your viewpoint). This book only takes characters from first through fifth levels, with the 6th through 20th levels available in "Advanced Hackmaster", three separate books (Players Handbook, Gamemasters Guide, and a book of monsters).

Each of those books costs \$59.99 at the Kenzer web site. ** Shudder **

Relax, friends. Although I'd purchased the soft-back, physical version of Hackmaster Basic, you can get the same stuff for free at the Kenzer web site. Go here:

http://www.kenzerco.com/hackmaster/downloads.php and download stuff. Don't download the adventures, unless you want to run the game. Print off the blank character sheets. Grab some dice, and then follow the directions in the "Hackmaster Basic Free RPG" PDF to roll up a character.

Then, let me know. Let us schedule a time and place to get together and play.

The trip to C.A.R.E. was a great success! The weather was amazing, the company was great, and the facilities were top notch. Plus, our tour group included some children, and their reactions to the animals (and to Perry's jokes) are always entertaining.

I go on and on about how great C.A.R.E. is, but I will keep it as brief as possible. Since I'm a Millennial, I have a short attention span, so I won't expect you to have a longer one! The think I liked best about C.A.R.E. was their commitment to not only caring for their own animals, but also their commitment to the animals they use to feed the big cats. They take livestock donations to give the cats fresh eat, but they only accept wounded or diseased animals so livestock is not sacrificed without reason. If they don't have livestock donated, they feed the cats chicken. This commitment to caring about other animals

as well as their own really sets them apart from other zoos and rescue centers.

I also liked seeing the size of the cat's enclosures! The intern who gave us the 1.5 hour tour explained the size of the enclosures for many of the cats, letting us know the reason some of them were in smaller shelters – mostly due to needing medical attention or being scared of large spaces. If you know me well enough, you know I love babies, and C.A.R.E. was no exception! There werethree groups of cats that stuck out for me. First was not a baby: they have a cat who was born seemingly female, but she had a testicle removed from her behind when she was older! She is an intersexual cat who confuses her two female house-mates with her hormones when they are in heat.

The other two groups are two "toddler" tigers, Boomer and Slade, and two "toddler" lions, Araali and Zuberi. Boomer and Slade are just 1.5 years old, though they look full grown. Slade was hilarious as we approached his enclosure: he crouched down behind one of his huts, and playfully "stalked" us – just like a house kitten! Araali and Zuberi are miracle lions: they both have a bone disorder called Wobbler's syndrome, but they were saved by an electromagnetic collar that stimulated their bone growth. It was the first time such a device has been used on big cats!




