One evening I decided we were going to have tacos. We didn't have any taco shells, so I stopped at a grocery store on my way home & picked up a box.



When he saw the box, he took a picture of it & posted it to Facebook, with the caption "We're having Italian tacos tonight." This was a reference to A Christmas Story, when Ralphie's dad won a "Major Award" and when it arrived it was labeled FRAGILE. He pronounced it "Fraa Gee Lay" and said it "must be Italian!"

Some people took it seriously, and asked for a recipe. (He was told that it was a Facebook Foul to make such an announcement without the recipe.)

So, I had to make one up (Tank helped).

Italian Tacos

Ingredients:

Chicken breast*

Italian Sausage*

Grape Tomatoes

Bell Pepper

Mushroom

Black Olives

White onion

Italian Dressing

Flour Tortillas Garlic Powder

Bacil

Olive Oil Spray

Shredded Mozzarella Cheese

Marinate chicken in Italian dressing overnight.

Veggies: Quarter the grape tomatoes, slice the bell pepper, slice the mushrooms*, slice the black olives, and cut the onion. Mix the veggies together, and marinate them in Italian dressing for a few hours.

Sprinkle basil and garlic powder over the veggies, and roast them in oven (or on grill) until browned.

Remove sausage from casing (or use ground sausage), cut chicken breast into small pieces, and saute the meat.

Spray a skillet with olive oil spray, and sprinkle garlic powder and basil into it. Heat each tortilla in the skillet separately until warm.

Assemble the tacos: meat, veggies, then top with shredded Mozzarella cheese.

Notes:

- I used a jar of pre-sliced mushrooms. If you do this too, remember to drain the liquid from the jar and wash the mushrooms, to remove that salty flavor.
- We didn't think about adding black olives and some white onion until we started eating. I would recommend using only a small amount of onion – for two people, maybe a quarter of one onion.
- No quantities are given, as we just kinda eyeballed the right quantity for enough tacos for two.
- We used 2 small chicken breasts (between ¼ and ½ lb total chicken)
- We used 3 Walmart brand Mild Italian Sausage Brats, peeled off the skin and cooked as if ground meat.

These turned out fabulous!! Some of our best work yet; and all based on a wild thread about taco shells marked FRAGILE.

After Action Reports:

Alliance Air Show

The USS Regulator sent a landing party to the Alliance Air Show. This year's Landing Party consisted of Brigadier Tank Clark, Commander Tracy Clark, Lieutenant Perry Brulotte, and Crewman Melissa Brulotte.

We arrived at the Alliance Airport shortly after the airshow opened to the public. As usual, there were lots of interesting aircraft on static display, including a B-52H, a B-19, a Soviet MiG-17, a F-86, one of the USAF's Thunderbirds, and an Osprey.

After strolling around, we bought a snack and some drinks, and found a place to set up our chairs. Despite repeated applications of sunscreen, most of us were still over-exposed to the sun, and by the end of the day, became slightly red

When the airshow started, it was wonderful! It started with propeller-driven stunt aircraft, both monoplanes and bi-planes. They tended to do similar stunts, but it was all very entertaining. The Jack Links "Screamin' Sasquatch" was an interesting aircraft -- a unique prop/jet biplane. A civilian jet

demonstration team, the Breitling Jet Team, performed some wonderful maneuvers in their L-39 Albatross Czech-made two-seat jet trainers. Later, a F-22 Raptor performed for the crowd, impressively showing off some amazing abilities. Toward the end of the Raptor's flight, it was joined by a P-51 Mustang. They flew in very close formation -- doubtless, the Mustang going as fast as it could, and the Raptor nearly as slow as possible.

The finale of the show was the Blue Angels, the U.S. Navy's demonstration team. I had seen the Blue Angels once upon a time as a child -- they were flying F-4 Phantoms then. Now, of course, they fly F/A-18 Hornets. They also have a C-130 Hercules called "Fat Albert" in support, which also flew some entertaining maneuvers.

All in all, a wonderful day with wonderful company. Too much fun!

Rangers, we've got a lot to talk about this month.

First, I'd like to repeat some information from the Ship's Meeting, and elaborate on it a little bit. STARFLEET Special Operations (SFSO) has been working very hard in recent months, and the SFSO experience has been enriched because of it.

If you point your web browser to https://sfisfso.wordpress.com/publications/ , you will see all the manuals and other documents available within the SFSO. In the middle of the screen are the SFSO Awards manual, the SFSO Training Manual, and the "Guide to the Wear and Appearance of STARFLEET Special Operations Uniforms and Insignia" (which I'll call the Uniform Manual). I'm going to talk about them in order.

The Awards manual lists the eleven awards the SFSO issues. Some of these awards have mulitple levels – the General Martok award, for example, is awarded for service in the SFSO (beginning in 2013, before which the records are rather iffy). There's a 1-year, a 3-year, a 5-year, and a 7-year ribbon; only one of these ribbons is worn at a time, and the ribbon is worn in the same spot relative to other ribbons, regardless. SFSO Ribbons are worn only on SFSO uniforms – you may not wear them with your STARFLEET Marine uniform (unless you wear them on the SFMC's Award Case, but that's a whole different thing) and you may not wear SFMC ribbons on the SFSO uniform. For some silly reason, some SFMC members have pitched a fit about the SFSO encroaching on the SFMC's turf, so the SFSO is going out of its way to avoid official crossover. (You can still be a member of both, or either... or none.)

The Awards manual also describes how to wear them. The Uniform guide tells us how to wear them – and I have some updates from what I said in the meeting. There are many, many options for official SFSO uniforms. The primary uniforms are from the TWOK era – and, of course, so is the USS Regulator. The department color (worn on the shoulder strap, the sleeve strap, and the stripe on the sides of the pants leg, as well as the turtleneck for officers) for the SFSO is Royal Blue. Optionally, you may add a diagonal royal blue stripe on your standard department shoulder strap and sleeve strap.

In my favorite era, TOS, the first version of the manual stated that the department color would be gray, with Security Red being an option. This has been corrected (again, to make sure the SFSO doesn't step on the SFMC's toes) to Hunter Green (with Red still being optional). I love this choice, and after Tracy is done making all the other uniforms she's got on her list, she'll be making me a Class B Duty uniform in Hunter Green and a Class A Dress uniform in the same color.

The only official cover at this time is the Royal Blue Beret, worn with the SFSO pin. I'm in the process of submitting an option for all uniforms OTHER THAN the Hunter Green TOS – a Royal Blue "overseas" cap (sometimes called a "field cap".) Its a lot cooler than a wool beret, and it's easier to tuck it into your belt when you uncover. For the Hunter Green, I think that Royal Blue would look horrible. The original beret color for the SFSO was tan, and I think either a return to the tan beret or for an optional tan "overseas" cap


would be a grand idea. (This will also be submitted for official approval.) Cover, of course, remains optional – as do uniforms, for that matter.

The third manual on the web site is the Training Manual, and I've talked about it before. I urge everyone to download a copy of the manual, and start working through the Ranger section, beginning with the Basic Training (Grade 1). When you have finished with a course on the list, write the date you've passed that course on your sheet. When you have completed all the courses in Grade 1, bring it to me so I can sign it and have Captain Cross sign it. Then, I can submit it to the Certifications Officer to make it official. Then, repeat the process with Grade 2 "Agent", and so on. When you have completed Grade 2, you will have completed the requirements for the Major Hayes/Ranger award... and you'll have another ribbon to add to your ribbon rack.

One more thing about the Meritorious Unit Commendation the 33rd STARFLEET Rangers won: There is only ONE of these awarded per year for each command (Rangers, SEALs, Recon, Intel, & MACO.) In talking with Fleet Captain TJ Allen (the Director of the SFSO), our unit is the largest Ranger team, and the most active Ranger team. I can't say enough how awesome y'all are.

Secondly, I have a brief review of a solo adventure for the **Dungeons & Dragons** ("Basic") game. Ghost of Lion Castle came out in 1984, and was designed to be played by one player, without a Dungeon Master (DM).

The "Basic" D&D game was different from the Advanced D&D game that was being published at the same time. There were fewer classes: Fighter, Magic-User, Thief, and Cleric were all human classes, or you could play a demihuman Dwarf. Halfling, or Elf. Combat used a combat resolution table, and play was similar in many ways to AD&D. The first game I Dmed was a



basic "Red Box" D&D game, and I've always enjoyed the system. (The Basic set was called the Red Box set, because it came in a red box, as opposed to the Expert "Blue Box" set.) Years later, TSR published the Rules Cyclopaedia, which consolidated all of the rules for D&D. As my friend Jeffery Webb said, you could play forever using only one reasonably small rulebook. Truly awesome.

Ghost of Lion Castle came complete with pre-generated characters – all either magic-users or Elves. (In this system, an Elf could wear any armor, use any weapon, and cast Magic-User spells, too. They had a smaller hit die – a d6 – than fighters and Dwarves, and they couldn't cast higher-level Magic-User spells, and they also leveled up slowly, but they were awesome to play.)

The adventure starts in a tavern. You select what PC you want to use, and then follow the directions on how to play. When you make a choice, the adventure tells you to go to a certain entry. Go to that entry, and follow the instructions there. Easy, right?

I have attempted to go through this adventure three times. All three of the PCs died. It's not easy, but it sure is fun.

I have a copy of this adventure in PDF format, as well as some of the D&D rules. If you want, let me know and I'll email it to you (or, you can bring me a USB thumb drive and I'll copy it over for you.)

The Birth of Hot Springs

Your Chief Science Crewman recently joined a group of civilians on a trip to Hot Springs, Arkansas, Earth. Hot Springs is so named for the thermal spring waters found there that flow out of the earth at an average temperature of 143 degrees F and at almost one million gallons per day. Hot Springs was the first federal reservation, effectively becoming the first national park in 1832 during President Andrew Jackson's administration. Soaking in the spring waters became popular around that time, and many bathhouses are still in operation today. Drinking of the spring waters is also favored by both tourists and locals, who were seen filling jugs at one of the many fountains in the city.

The water in Hot Springs is heated by geothermal heat. The temperature of the Earth increases with depth and the water is heated when it comes into contact with hot rocks deep within the Earth's crust. This is in contrast to hot springs that are heated by magma in volcanic zones such as Yellowstone National Park.

One of the most interesting finds at Hot Springs is the visible blue-green algae that grow in water that is almost too hot to touch. These algae are thermophiles that have adapted to live in temperatures of 158 to 163 degrees F (70 to 73 degrees C). One of the species found at Hot Springs, *Phormidium treleasei*, is so rare that it has only been found at 5 other places in the world!

There are a lot of other thermophilic creatures that can be found at Hot Spring, AR, not to mention a plethora of history. Crewman Brulotte highly recommends that you visit!
